Prevent Child Abuse Utah (PCAU) combats the problem of child abuse through prevention programs, training and education. PCAU's mission is to forge and guide a community commitment to prevent child abuse, in all its forms. PCAU has been the state's largest nonprofit child abuse prevention organization for 28 years.

In 2008-2009, PCAU reached 73,276 children and adults with free school-based & community prevention programs.

School-based Prevention Programs

To stop the cycle of abuse, children must learn what to do if they, or someone they know, are being abused. Child abuse prevention programs must be ongoing, and occur in safe and neutral circumstances.

With trained, professional staff, PCAU provides school-based child abuse prevention programs throughout Utah. These programs are offered K-12 and are approved by the State Board of Education.
